### **Electrostatic Discharge (ESD)**

After removing a board from its protective wrapper or from the system, place the board component side up on a grounded, static free surface. Use a conductive foam pad if available but not the board wrapper. Do not slide board over any surface.

**Installing or removing jumpers:** A jumper is a small plastic encased conductor that slips over two jumper pins. Some jumpers have a small tab on top that can be gripped with fin-gertips or with a pair of fine needle nosed pliers. If the jumpers do not have such a tab, take care when using needle nosed pliers to remove or install a jumper; grip the narrow sides of the jumper with the pliers, never the wide sides. Gripping the wide sides can dam-age the contacts inside the jumper, causing intermittent problems with the function con-trolled by that jumper. Take care to grip with, but not squeeze, the pliers or other tool used to remove a jumper, or the pins on the board may bend or break.

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# **Chapter 1** Hardware Installation

### 1-1 Installation Precautions

The motherboard/system contain numerous delicate electronic circuits and components which can become damaged as a result of electrostatic discharge (ESD). Prior to installation, carefully read the service guide and follow these procedures:

- Prior to installation, do not remove or break motherboard S/N (Serial Number) sticker or warranty sticker provided by your dealer. These stickers are required for warranty validation.
- Always remove the AC power by unplugging the power cord from the power outlet before installing or removing the motherboard or other hardware components.
- When connecting hardware components to the internal connectors on the motherboard, make sure they are connected tightly and securely.
- · When handling the motherboard, avoid touching any metal leads or connectors.
- It is best to wear an electrostatic discharge (ESD) wrist strap when handling electronic components such as a motherboard, CPU or memory. If you do not have an ESD wrist strap, keep your hands dry and first touch a metal object to eliminate static electricity.
- Prior to installing the motherboard, please have it on top of an antistatic pad or within an
  electrostatic shielding container.
- Before unplugging the power supply cable from the motherboard, make sure the power supply has been turned off.
- Before turning on the power, make sure the power supply voltage has been set according to the local voltage standard.
- Before using the product, please verify that all cables and power connectors of your hardware components are connected.
- To prevent damage to the motherboard, do not allow screws to come in contact with the motherboard circuit or its components.
- Make sure there are no leftover screws or metal components placed on the motherboard or within the computer casing.
- Do not place the computer system on an uneven surface.
- Do not place the computer system in a high-temperature environment.
- Turning on the computer power during the installation process can lead to damage to system components as well as physical harm to the user.
- If you are uncertain about any installation steps or have a problem related to the use of the product, please consult a certified computer technician.

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# **Chapter 3** System Hardware Installation



### **Pre-installation Instructions**

Computer components and electronic circuit boards can be damaged by electrostatic discharge. Working on computers that are still connected to a power supply can be extremely dangerous. Follow the simple guidelines below to avoid damage to your computer or injury to yourself.

- Always disconnect the computer from the power outlet whenever you are working inside the computer case.
- If possible, wear a grounded wrist strap when you are working inside the computer case.
   Alternatively, discharge any static electricity by touching the bare metal system of the computer case, or the bare metal body of any other grounded appliance.
- Hold electronic circuit boards by the edges only. Do not touch the components on the board unless it is necessary to do so. Do not flex or stress the circuit board.
- Leave all components inside the static-proof packaging until you are ready to use the component for the installation.

# 3-1 Removing Chassis Cover




Before you remove or install the system cover

• Make sure the system is not turned on or connected to AC power.


### Follow these instructions to remove the middle chassis cover:

- 1. Loosen the thumbscrew securing the chassis cover.
- 2. Lift up to remove the middle chassis cover.
- 3. To reinstall the chassis cover reverse steps 1-2.



#### Follow these instructions to remove the back chassis cover:


- 1. Remove the screw securing the chassis cover.
- 2. Push down the indentations and slide the cover backward to remove the cover.
- 3. To reinstall the chassis cover reverse steps 1-2.



# 3-2 Removing and Installing the Fan Duct

### Follow these instructions to remove the fan duct:

- 1. Lift up to remove the fan duct.
- To reinstall the fan duct, align the fan duct with the guiding groove. Push down the fan duct until it is firmly seated on the system.



# 3-3 Installing the CPU and Heat Sink



Read the following guidelines before you begin to install the CPU:

- •Make sure that the motherboard supports the CPU.
- •Always turn off the computer and unplug the power cord from the power outlet before installing the CPU to prevent hardware damage.
- •Unplug all cables from the power outlets.
- •Disconnect all telecommunication cables from their ports.
- •Place the system unit on a flat and stable surface.
- •Open the system according to the instructions.



### WARNING!

Failure to properly turn off the server before you start installing components may cause serious damage. Do not attempt the procedures described in the following sections unless you are a qualified service technician.

#### Follow these instructions to install the CPU:

 Align the processor to the carrier so that the gold triangle on the processor aligns with the triangle on the carrier, and then install the processor into the carrier.


**NOTE:** Apply thermal compound evenly on the top of the CPU.


- Carefully flip the heatsink over. Align the carrier assembly so that the triangle on the carrier aligns with the triangle on the heatsink, and then install the carrier assembly onto the bottom of the heatsink.
- 3. Remove the CPU socket cover.


**NOTE:** Save and replace the CPU socket cover if the processor is removed from its socket.


- Align the heatsink to the CPU socket using the guide pins and make sure the gold triangle is in the correct orientation. Then place the heatsink onto the top of the CPU socket.
- 5. Secure the heatsink by tightening the screws in sequential order  $(1 \rightarrow 2 \rightarrow 3 \rightarrow 4)$ .


**NOTE:** When removing the heatsink, loosen the screws in reverse order  $(4 \rightarrow 3 \rightarrow 2 \rightarrow 1)$ .













• To install/remove the Intel heatsink use a T30-Lobe screwdriver or drill bit with a screw torque of 8.0 +/- 0.5kgf\*cm

### 3-4 Installing the Memory




Read the following guidelines before you begin to install the memory:

- Make sure that the motherboard supports the memory. It is recommended that memory of the same capacity, brand, speed, and chips be used.
- Always turn off the computer and unplug the power cord from the power outlet before installing
  the memory to prevent hardware damage.
- Memory modules have a foolproof design. A memory module can be installed in only one direction. If you are unable to insert the memory, switch the direction.

### 3-4-1 Eight Channel Memory Configuration

This motherboard provides 16 DDR4 memory slots and supports Eight Channel Technology. After the memory is installed, the BIOS will automatically detect the specifications and capacity of the memory.



### 3-4-2 Installing a Memory




Before installing a memory module, make sure to turn off the computer and unplug the power cord from the power outlet to prevent damage to the memory module.

Be sure to install DDR4 DIMMs on this motherboard.

Follow these instructions to install the Memory:

- 1. Insert the DIMM memory module vertically into the DIMM slot, and push it down.
- 2. Close the plastic clip at both edges of the DIMM slots to lock the DIMM module.
- 3. Reverse the installation steps when you want to remove the DIMM module.

# 3-5 Installing the PCI Expansion Card




Voltages can be present within the server whenever an AC power source is connected. This
voltage is present even when the main power switch is in the off position. Ensure that the
system is powered-down and all power sources have been disconnected from the server prior to
installing a PCIe card.

### Follow these instructions to install PCI Expansion card:

- Remove the screw securing the slot cover to the PCle bracket.
- Remove the slot cover from the PCIe bracket.
- Orient the PCle card with the riser guide slot and push in the direction of the arrow until the PCle card sits in the PCle card connector.
- Secure the PCle card with the screw.



# 3-6 Installing the Hard Disk Drive




Read the following guidelines before you begin to install the Hard disk drive:

- · Take note of the drive tray orientation before sliding it out.
- The tray will not fit back into the bay if inserted incorrectly.
- Make sure that the HDD is connected to the HDD connector on the backplane.


#### Follow these instructions to install a 3.5" hard disk drive:

- 1. Loosen the thumbscrew securing the left/right side chassis cover.
- 2. Open the left/right side cover.
- 3. Press the release button on the HDD tray.

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# Chapter 5 BIOS Setup

BIOS (Basic Input and Output System) records hardware parameters of the system in the EFI on the motherboard. Its major functions include conducting the Power-On Self-Test (POST) during system startup, saving system parameters, loading the operating system etc. The BIOS includes a BIOS Setup program that allows the user to modify basic system configuration settings or to activate certain system features. When the power is turned off, the battery on the motherboard supplies the necessary power to the CMOS to keep the configuration values in the CMOS.

To access the BIOS Setup program, press the <DEL> key during the POST when the power is turned on.



- BIOS flashing is potentially risky, if you do not encounter any problems when using the current BIOS version, it is recommended that you don't flash the BIOS. To flash the BIOS, do it with caution. Inadequate BIOS flashing may result in system malfunction.
- It is recommended that you not alter the default settings (unless you need to) to prevent system
  instability or other unexpected results. Inadequately altering the settings may result in system's
  failure to boot. If this occurs, try to clear the CMOS values and reset the board to default values.
  (Refer to the Exit section in this chapter or introductions of the battery/clearing CMOS jumper in
  Chapter 1 for how to clear the CMOS values.)
